Muslim-Christian-Jewish Reflections on Compassion and Peace

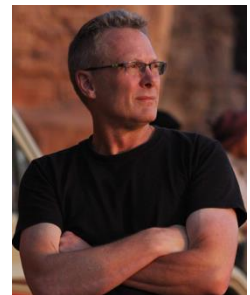
